Eagle Escort:

The Eagle Escort will be at the front of the Eagle Center at least thirty minutes prior to the start of the ceremony. They will escort the Eagle Parents to their seats five minutes prior to the start of the ceremony. The members of the Eagle Escort are:

Voice of the Eagle:

The Voice of the Eagle makes a final check of the PA system at least fifteen minutes before the ceremony begins.

SEATING: Left Side of the Eagle Center:

First Row

The first row on the left side of the Eagle Center will be reserved for the Eagle Scouts, and the Eagle Escort. The Eagle's will sit on the escorts' left, next to the center aisle.

(Seating from left to right)

(Eagle) Scout, Escorts.

Second Row

The second row will be reserved for the Senior Patrol Leader and the color guard.

Third Row

The six or twelve Scouts chosen to participate in the "Trail to Eagle" portion of the ceremony will be seated on the third row from right to left in the order which they will come forward during the ceremony: Scout, Tenderfoot, 2nd Class, 1st Class, Star, and Life.

The remaining troop members will sit behind them.

SEATING: Right Side of the Eagle Center:

First Row

The first row on the right side of the Eagle Center will be reserved for the Eagle Scout's parents.

Second Row

The second row, right side of the Eagle Center will be reserved for immediate family.

Third Row

The third row and beyond Is reserved for family and friends.

STAGE SETTING, PROPS, ETC.:

The table on stage will hold the following items, arranged, from front to back:

Neckerchief
Neckerchief Slide
Mother's Pin
Dad's Pin
Eagle Pins
Eagle Certificate signed by the Chief Scout Executive
Plaques
Mentor Pins

A small table in front of main table will support the COH candle bar and the Eagle Crest. If possible, new blue and red candles should be used. You will need 12 red candles and 1 white candle for the candle bar and 3 blue candles for the Eagle Crest. Place foil under candle bar to protect table.

(All candles need to be pre-lit to assist in their lighting during the ceremony. The Scout Spirit candle will be the only one burning during Pre-Ceremony activities, which will be lit three (3) minutes before the ceremony begins)

PRESENTATION ITEMS:

A pulpit or lectern will be placed stage left, and program participants will keep a copy of this ceremony script at the lectern or pulpit for reference.

FLAGS:

Flag stands will be placed on the floor at the front corners of the stage. When displayed from a staff in a church or public auditorium, the flag of the United States of America should hold the position of superior prominence, in advance of the audience, and in the position of honor at the clergyman's or speaker's right as he faces the audience.

MISCELLANEOUS:

Troop 765 should assemble, in full uniform, at the main entrance to the Eagle center at least 5 minutes before the ceremony. All scouts who are to be seated before the ceremony will be assembled by patrol in a single file line headed by the six "Trail to Eagle" scouts. Ten minutes before the ceremony begins, the Senior Patrol Leader will be responsible for the orderly entry and seating of the Troop.

All other program participants should also arrive and assemble at least thirty minutes before the start of the ceremony. Immediately following the entry and seating of the troop, the Senior Patrol Leader, Color Guard, and the Eagle Scout and Eagle Escort will assemble at the main entrance to The Eagle Center.

100 SCOUTS

Committee Memi	oer:

Of the 100 boys who become Scouts, it must be confessed that 30 will drop out in their first year. Perhaps this may be regarded as a failure, but in later life all of these will remember that they had been Scouts and will speak well of the program.

Of the 100, only rarely will one ever appear before a juvenile court judge. Twelve of the 100 will be from families that belong to no church. Through Scouting, these 12 and many of their families will be brought into contact with a church and will continue to be active all their lives. Six of the 100 will become pastors.

Each of the 100 will learn something from Scouting. Almost all will develop hobbies that will add interest throughout the rest of their lives. Approximately one half will serve in the military and in varying degrees' profit from their scout training. At least one will use it to save another person's life, and many will credit it with saving their own.

Two of the 100 will reach the rank of Eagle, and at least one will later say that he values his Eagle badge above his college degree. Many will find their future vocation through merit-badge work and Scouting contacts. Seventeen of the 100 boys will later become Scout leaders and will give leadership to thousands of additional boys.

Only one in four boys in America will become Scouts, but it is interesting to know that of the leaders of this nation in business, religion, and politics, three out of four were Scouts.

REVIEW OF EAGLE RANK CRITERIA

Chairman, Scout Advancement Board:
The awarding of the Eagle Badge is an important and serious occasion, the climax and the goal for which a Scout works for many years. It is an occasion for pride and joy, and a time for serious contemplation. It is the culmination of the efforts of the various leaders of this Troop. The Eagle Award is the highest and most coveted rank in Scouting; the last major step in the advancement program. One out of fifty (or 2%) in the United States reach the Eagle Rank. At this point, we trust you have achieved the building of character, training of leadership, and the practice of service.
To become an Eagle Scout, a Scout must earn a minimum of 21 merit badges, including 13, which are required. He must serve actively in a troop leadership position for a period of six months after achieving the rank of Life Scout. While a Life Scout, he must plan, develop, and carry out a service project helpful to a religious institution, school, or community in a manner worthy of an Eagle Scout. He must demonstrate, through the testimony of character references and otherwise, that he lives by the principles of the Scout Oath and Law in his daily life. Finally, he must appear before a Board of Review.
